2 INT. DOUGLAS KITCHEN - DAY

DOUGLAS

DOUGLAS

So you'll give me the nickel then?

Margaret stands up and laughs. She goes over to her pocketbook and pulls out a nickel.

She hands it to him.

MARGARET

This I can give you. But I can't make the people running the Lee let you in. Seems like you got to go see that for yourself though. When they turn you away, don't get too upset. Just forget about Birth of a Nation.

DOUGLAS

I gotta get in. It's the greatest movie ever made; I got to see it!
